Most brands of the above have scent added **AND** if you use even one of the proceeding products which does not say scent free (fragrance free), you are not scent free and **you** are wearing the equivalent of perfume. ALL of the above products except those followed by an asterisk can be purchased perfume free (fragrance free).

Perfume is added to at least 30 categories of products and sensitive people react to all and to any of them and *if you use more than one of them you double the scent impact by each additional one you use.* 

Take the *perfume free challenge* and spend the time to find and to purchase scent free (fragrance free) products which even exist with industrial strength products – for the sake of your own health and for those of us who are allergic to these chemicals. All of them are available in all major supermarkets and *do not cost any more than their smelly cousins*.
